Oklahoma Turning Point Year 1: Summary Sheet

State: **OKLAHOMA**

Lead Agency: Oklahoma State Department of Health

<u>Turning Point Partnership:</u> The Turning Point Steering Committee adopted by-laws and has become an independent group: the *Oklahoma Turning Point Council*. This group will work to restructure public health and form community-based partnerships to improve health.

Implementation Priority: "Expand Turning Point to all counties through new partnerships."

Implementation outcomes:

- 1. 18 new local Turning Point Partnerships per year for 4 years
- 2. A formal process for a partnership approach to public health decision making
- 3. New mechanisms for flexible use of public health resources

Unique Partners:

- -Faith community partners
- -The business partners on the Tulsa Partnership have formed a subcommittee to increase the awareness of the business community of the importance of public health in reducing the economic costs of poor health in Oklahoma.
- -The Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce
- -The Turning Point Partnership is forming a partnership with the partnership *Covering Kids*-a RWJF funded initiative to increase access to Medicaid for children. They will be assisting *Covering Kids* to expand to Turning Point communities.

Products and Outcomes to Date:

- Major Public Health Infrastructure Change: monies previously designated for specific program service delivery have been reallocated to community-focused activities through local Turning Point partnerships.
- Major Public Health Infrastructure Change: Office of Community Development was created to support the development of partnerships as a public health strategy.
- Major Public Health Infrastructure Change: The State Board of Health officially recommended the expansion of Turning Point to all 77 counties in Oklahoma as a way to improve the relatively poor health status in Oklahoma.
- Major Public Health Infrastructure Change: The major systems change that occurred as a result of
 this policy turned a centralized, top-down health organization into a locally driven system.
 Communities will identify their leading health problems and mobilize to develop intervention
 programs to improve health status.

Anticipated impact of implementation on the 10 leading health indicators:

• Each of the 77 Turning Point communities will identify an indicator specific to their community and develop intervention programs to improve health status.
